"Even a life dedicated to prayer and meditation needs to maintain a quality of caring together for others. The mystery of this caring together is that it not only asks for community, but also creates it."

The point of all this community and caring is to connect others to the fullness of God. Nouwen continues "Not only the death of Jesus, but our death, too, is meant to bear fruit in other people's lives...How can I live so that I can continue to be fruitful when I am no longer here among my family and friends?"

I am encouraged by Nouwen's words regarding the eternity of our connection with God "To write about dying and death without mentioning the resurrection is like writing about sailing and not mentioning the wind...The resurrection is God's way of revealing to us that nothing that belongs to God will ever go to waste."

Where is Your Heart?

I have recently been reading a book called *Jesus Doesn't Care About Your Messy House, He Cares About Your Heart* by Dana K. White. I have enjoyed several of her books, so I automatically picked this up when it came out. Having grown up in the church the title of the book makes me say "Yeah, obviously." I found myself thinking as I read about all the ways I don't live like I know it.

Dana centers most of what she says around examples of her house and learning to keep it under control because that is where she learned many of these lessons. God cares about your heart and wants your heart to be focused on him. He wants you to rest in him.

One area I have struggled with is my health. Over the last decade, I have been sick more than not. My body has taken a beating with one problem after another. I struggle with the fact that I can't do the things I used to as easily. My body has no extra energy and sometimes what feels like not even enough energy to do what needs doing in a day. But instead of letting the changes frustrate me, I need to accept where I am right now. I need to make sure my focus is on God and what he wants me to do and not focus on what I could do 15 or 20 years ago.

Creating a Holy Empty Box

Life is hard. Life is overwhelming. But, life is also a gift. I have had the word steward, or stewardship, on my heart a lot this year. Am I stewarding my time, my money, my life the way God wants me to? If I am being honest, with both God and myself, the answer is no. I should not be shocked then if life is becoming too much to handle if I am not taking care of what God has given to me.

Knowing this, I have made some changes, alongside God giving me the strength when I do not always know how to change or want to change. God provided a new job in perfect timing. I have come home from work with joy, even on hard days. I have made a new budget and stuck to it. I no longer rush through my days off; I enjoy each minute of it. All of which has helped life calm down.

But I am still overwhelmed, anxious, and surrounded by noise. Life is not completely slowed down. God has been reminding me that I need to be stewarding my relationship with Him as well. I can read my devotions daily, and still not have spent any true time with God. What would happen if we allowed our spirit to rest in God's peace 24/7 and allowed our bodies to have a level of Sabbath every day?

The people-pleasing and the little requirements we allow to be placed on us go away. The peace of the Lord has room to enter your space, allowing the Lord's voice to be louder than the voices of this world. Fear, obsessive thoughts, and dwelling in unholy places for momentary pleasure, are no longer places we hang out. Stewarding a set apart space to dwell in God's presence, living on His time schedule, brings comfort, rather than crippling anxiety. We are never going to make every decision perfectly. But when we dwell in God's presence, we can rest in knowing that we answer to Him and Him alone.

I have been told my whole life; that women have many tabs open in their heads and no empty box. It is just the way it is. I have been told that life in the 21st century is fast-paced, and that is what it is. But I know a God bigger than the, "It has always and will always be."

I know a God who did the impossible before and can do it again. I know a God that can enter your most sacred space and create a holy empty box where you can rest in Him, and Him alone. I have no empty box, I live a rushed life, but I know God can change that. When we give God access to everything about us, He can heal, restore, and create anew.

A Devotional Thought

A WARRIOR'S WARDROBE

Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, ¹⁵ and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. ¹⁶ In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. ¹⁷ Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

~ Ephesians 6:14-17 NIV

We have been walking through the books of I and II Thessalonians on Sunday mornings in church and came across the following passage with a mention of the helmet of salvation.

For you are all sons of light and sons of the day.

We do not belong to the night or the darkness. ⁶ So then, we must not sleep, like the rest, but we must stay awake and be serious. ⁷ For those who sleep, sleep at night, and those who get drunk are drunk at night. ⁸ But since we belong to the day, we must be serious and put the armor of faith and love on our chests, and put on a helmet of the hope of salvation.

~ | Thessalonians 5:5-8 HCSB

I associated the "armor of faith and love on our chest and a helmet of the hope of salvation" with the Armor of God passage from Ephesians 6. I was taken aback as I have never noticed the Armor of God referenced anywhere else in the Bible. To my surprise look what I came across next:

And do this, knowing the time, that now it is high
time to awake out of sleep; for now our
salvation is nearer than when we first believed.

12 The night is far spent, the day is at hand. Therefore
let us cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on
the armor of light. ~ Romans 13:11-12 NKJV

Did you notice that both passages not only reference the Armor of God but associate it with being in the light? Both urge us to be awake and covered for battle because the time is short. We are Warriors of Hope who wear the Armor of God to fight against the darkness, injustice, and untruth in our world. We are told to be ready to share the gospel of peace. As we enter each day of our lives we want our minds covered with "the helmet of the hope of salvation" because our environment is full of untruth and evil.

Truth is not spoken in the streets;
what is honest is not allowed to enter the city.

15 Truth cannot be found anywhere, and people who refuse to do evil are attacked.

The LORD looked and could not find any justice, and he was displeased.

16 He could not find anyone to help the people, and he was surprised that there was no one to help.

So he used his own power to save the people; his own goodness gave him strength.

17 He covered himself with goodness like armor.

He put the helmet of salvation on his head.

He put on his clothes for punishing and wrapped himself in the coat of his strong love.

~ Isaiah 59:14b-17 NCV

Did you notice who wore them first? God himself put on the helmet of salvation! The helmet was first worn by our God who is mighty to save. These items that we have been urged to wear are literally the Armor of God like King Saul taking off his armor to give to David. God has given us the helmet, shield, breastplate, and sword not just as symbols of our position but as borrowed out of his own wardrobe! Holy hand-me-downs make up our Warrior's Wardrobe, go light your world!
